As the guest of honour at the S1 Inauguration Ceremony, our archery team coach, Mr. Wong Chiu-Keung, was invited to share his experiences both within and beyond the classroom. He reflected on those years and offered us a vivid glimpse of life as a Truelighter.



Mr. Wong served as a dedicated teacher for 30 years of experience at our school.

Legacy in sports education

Drawing on his breadth of experience, Mr. Wong later became the school's director of the sports department. Our school was among the first to offer fencing and archery, fielding teams that competed beyond campus. Leading both squads with passion was demanding, yet Mr. Wong persisted, guiding them to championship titles. The volleyball and basketball teams also flourished, ultimately advancing from Division 2 to Division 1. Some of his former students went far beyond to represent Hong Kong across multiple sports such as fencing or archery, earning places on national teams and competing at prestigious regional and international events. Their paths from school training grounds to elite arenas reflect years of structured coaching, mental resilience, and a culture of excellence he helped build achievements that continue to inspire everyone.

Since retiring in 2014, he has stayed in close contact with his former students—now grown—continuing to cheer on their progress. Having watched them mature through years of teaching and training, he remains a steady presence in their lives. Mr. Wong’s decades-long journey from teacher to coach is a testament to dedication, resilience, and the lasting impact of a great educator.

Few would have imagined he would take on so many roles in one lifetime. Mr. Wong once taught Chinese and Chinese History on the old campus and also served as a fencing coach. In a follow-up interview after the ceremony, he further shared valuable insights on teaching.



Preferring the title "teacher" over "educator", Mr. Wong highlighted the personal connection he shares with students, which reflected the dynamic nature of his role.

Initially, Mr. Wong faced challenges communicating with students due to the generational gap but saw this as an opportunity for growth. He encouraged the use of simple language to bridge communication gaps. He stressed, "understanding students' perspectives is crucial for effective teaching and fostering a conducive learning environment."

He believes teachers should help students find their own meaning in learning, employing a teaching style that is friendly yet professional, because "teaching is a performing art." Having previously taught Chinese history, Mr. Wong now focuses on physical education, where he aims to engage students actively.



“Teaching should be flexible and not confined to traditional methods. Every student can be taught well with different methods.”

Mr. Wong's insights remind us of the importance of adaptability in teaching and the enduring impact a dedicated teacher can have on their students.
